Treasure Unearthed on Seventh Street East!

Join us on June 5 to celebrate the Grand Opening of The Sonoma Garden Park

A children's treasure hunt is among the activities planned for the grand opening of the Sonoma Garden Park, formerly known as the Pauline Bond Community Garden, on Seventh Street East. The Saturday, June 5 opening features live music and refreshments, garden tours, demonstrations, an herb walk, children's activities, and sales of live plants and fresh produce, flowers, and herbs. The event also celebrates the renaming of the park.

Why the new name? "Many Valley residents have heard of the Pauline Bond Community Garden, but few are aware that this amazing 6-acre garden is actually a city park," explains Mollyanne Meyn, Garden

Coordinator. "Pauline was a local school teacher who owned and lived on the property for many years. When she willed the land to the people of Sonoma in 1979, she did so with the requirement that it be preserved as a public park for everyone to enjoy. This gift to the community is a little-known treasure that we hope everyone will want to rediscover. By renaming the park we hope to inspire visitors both old and new to come and experience this gem of community space."

The grand opening event is the kickoff to a full season of special events at the Sonoma Garden Park, including the weekly Harvest Market, outdoor movie nights (with films screened on the barn door!), Volunteer Saturdays, cooking demonstrations in the new cobb oven, and classes and workshops throughout the summer. Proceeds from all events will fund development of new programs and improvements to the Garden, such as a native plant nursery, expansion of the family garden plot area, additional xeriscaping and habitat restoration, volunteer and mentoring opportunities, public meeting areas, improved handicapped access, fire safety features, and installation of electricity and permanent restrooms.

Festivities take place on Saturday, June 5, 2004, from 11am to 2pm at the Sonoma Garden Park on Seventh Street East between Denmark and MacArthur. For further information, please call the Garden at 707-695-2164. &

Garden education grows minds, bodies & hearts Sonoma Valley students take a walk in the park

A NOTE FROM MISS STEPHANIE AND THE MORNING GLORY KINDERGARTEN

In the kindergarten this year, as we have gotten to know each other, the "Morning Glories" have gotten to know our neighborhood, and the whole community too. We have met the people, animals, and plants that grow along side our school as we walk our varied routes to nearby parks. Yet of all the exploring we have done, there is one place, full of interesting people, creatures, and green growing things, that has been most special for the Morning Glories, children, teachers, and parents alike. This place is the Sonoma Garden Park, which we have visited every month since the beginning of the year.

Our visits have included stories in the barn with the sixth grade, fig harvesting and drying, a bonfire to welcome winter, and working in the orchard. Farmer Molly has lead us on great adventures. During each visit we drop off our compost, and the children love to search through the piles where insects thrive. We have collected eggs and shoveled goat manure at the Honey Farm next door. At the Honey Farm, Farmer Sam has introduced us to giant turkeys, honeybees, sheep, chickens, goats, sheep dogs, and even a tiny parrot named Jo-Jo. All of this is really just the beginning. Any of you who have been to the Garden know the endless possibilities for exploration that await you there.

I have marveled at how the Garden, with its open space, lush rows, lively compost, fig forest, hay castle, tiny pond, and friendly farmers brings out the best in the children. In the Garden, the children receive what they truly need. They are given beauty, wonder, and plenty of space to move and play. They experience a true connection with the natural world, and are nurtured by the rhythms and cycles of the Garden. They see adults working with purpose and care, and they are able to imitate this. For these reasons, every trip to the Garden has been a joy, well worth our efforts.

The parents and teachers have also been nurtured by these things, and by the lessons the Garden offers. In the Garden, just as in our classroom and our school community, diversity brings harmony, health, and vitality. The creatures that poke and sting or eat rotting pumpkins play a role that is just as important as those creatures that offer shade, medicine, or fruit. That's the web of life, which supports us all!

Looking around the Community Garden, we see lush, full rows. The soil is rich. The barn is sturdy and always open. The greenhouse is full of sprouts and the trees are full of fruit. Yet, the Garden has not always been this way. Countless hands and hearts have worked rocky and weedy soil to create what now appears to grow effortlessly. Countless hearts and hands continue to maintain the old growth and make way for the new. The Garden was not always so lush, but the community held its vision and worked towards it together, just as we have done and continue to do for our school.

The plants in the Garden are tended with care. They are given what they need at just the right time so that they will grow up to be sturdy and strong. Well rooted, these plants will, in their time, bear healthy fruit, and seed. In this same way, we nourish our children, so that they too will grow from a strong foundation towards maturity, each bearing fruit in their own time.

With endless and joyful parent support, the Morning Glory class has just begun to cultivate our own patch at the Community Garden. We look forward to growing strawberries, beans, cucumbers, and all of the things you need to make a good pizza sauce. There in the Garden we will grow more than tasty food. We will grow the children's minds, bodies, and hearts, as well as our own understanding of the nature of things.
